| Age 6-14 boys went to primary school where they learned poetry and how to play the lyre. Depending on their teacher, they might also learn drama, math, public speaking, government, or the flute. | Cultural Education | Just a little reading and writing - enough to be able to understand and follow military orders. |
| To provide a well-educated "citizen," able to serve the community in both peace and war. | Goal of Education | To provide a well-trained fighting force |
| 2 years of military training between the ages of 18-20. Can be called up to serve at any time if Athens is threatened. | Military Obligations of Citizens | All children begin military training at 6 or 7. Live in barracks. If they pass a test at 18 they become citizens. Boys stay in military and serve until the age of 60. |
| In Athens women were not considered citizens. There role in society was to run the household. They attended weddings, festivals, funerals, and visited female neighbors - for brief periods of time. | Role of Women | If women passed their physical test at 18, they became citizens. While their job was to give birth to strong babies, they could also own property, run a business, and participate in government. |
| Democracy/ Dictatorship | Type of Government | Dual monarchy, oligarchy, democracy |
| All citizens were members of the Assembly and were expected to participate by serving on juries and voting for new laws. Citizens could also serve as a member of the Council of 500 for 2 two-year terms where they would prepare bills to become laws and handle the daily business of Athens. | Participation in Government | All citizens were members of the Assembly and could vote on new laws. If you were over 30 you might serve on the Council of Elders where you would manage the day to day business of Sparta. |
